Latest Update re: resolution no. 1, WUCWO Statutory Assembly, Arlington Va, USA, June 2006.



A small WUCWO delegation led by its President General accompanied by the Secretary General; Ecclesiastical Assistant; Vice President General/Board Member Australia, representing the proposer of the Resolution, CWLA Inc; and Board Member Hungary, representing the Resolution seconder, KALASZ; was received by HE Francis Cardinal Arinze, Prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments at that Di-

castery on Friday November 17th.

The outcomes of that very cordial meeting were an assurance that the process is on-going and a request that WUCWO furnish to HE as soon as possible more specific information in order to enhance the two requests contained in the Resolution.

CWLA asks that in the coming months prayers of members be offered for the special intention of the success of these two requests to the Holy See

A Child who should be born

Marcia Riordan's article in the Herald Sun 27/11/06 refers to a 6 year investigation into a pregnancy terminated at 31 weeks, when the child was mature enough to have been born alive.

The 'benefit' for the traumatised woman at the centre of the controversy was to prevent the suicide she threatened because she believed that she was carrying a child with a disability. Not a lethal disability, but dwarfism. The problem was not the pregnancy itself, but that the child would fail to grow to a normal height.

Victoria's criminal law states that any person who, with intent to destroy the life of a child capable of being born alive, by any wilful act unlawfully causes such child to die before it has an existence independent of its mother shall be guilty of the indictable offence of child destruction. The penalty is 15 years imprisonment yet no one stood trial and none were prosecuted. Did the destruction of a viable child solve this woman's problem? I guess not since thousands of women throughout the world are coming forward to seek help and healing after an

abortion experience.

The story coincides nicely with the move to create human embryos for experimentation and destruction. Dishonest claims and fraudulent results are already part of the scene, yet not one person has benefited from treatment with embryonic stem cells. There have however been isolated accounts of patients benefiting from treatment with adult stem cells that have no ethical barrier and can be harvested from the olfactory mucosa, the organ of smell in the nose.

Concern for the child even before birth, from the very first moment of conception and then throughout the years of infancy and youth, is the primary and fundamental test of the relationship of one human being to another. (Familiaris consortio n26)

The obligation for any society to care for children is primarily a moral one yet the British Nuffield Council on Bioethics says disabled babies who are born prematurely should not be routinely resuscitated. The council is expected to set forth guidelines for doctors and patients suggesting that disabled babies born after 22 weeks into the pregnancy or earlier be left to die rather than given proper medical assistance. According to a report in the Age newspaper, parents' wishes are only to be taken into account beginning at the 23rd week of pregnancy. Pro-life groups and the Catholic Church strongly oppose killing disabled newborns.

"While it is both moral and legal to withhold or withdraw aggressive medical treatment in cases when it is futile or unduly burdensome, it can never be right to sanction action aimed at the deliberate killing of an innocent human being," the Catholic Church said in a statement. Alison Davis of No Less Human, a disability rights group, says disabled people are "appalled and afraid" by the council's suggestions. "Once it is established that killing is acceptable on grounds of disability it is inevitable that it will spread to encompass increasing numbers of victims," Davis, who has both spina bifida and hydrocephalus, warned.

When individual human life becomes subservient to the hypothetical benefits of embryonic stem cells or to the inconvenience of treating and caring for someone with a disability the Western world is in deep trouble.

As P.D. James author of the "The Children of Men" says, "Man has rejected God's greatest gift, procreation, and so He has taken it away". I recommend the film to you all.

NATSICC is the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council. Each State and Territory has a representative elected by local communities, and who is active in their parish, school or organisation.

The Conference in Alice Springs commemorated the 20th year since Pope John Paul II visited and gave his memorable address to the Aboriginal peoples.

The first official National Conference was held in Adelaide in 1991 and they formed a national organisation. This was officially recognised by the Catholic Bishops Conference in 1992 as a consultative body on issues concerning Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to the Australian Catholic Church. Assemblies have been held in Darwin 1994, Broome 1997, Kurrajong 2000 and Adelaide 2003.

With over 600 registrations we attended many moving ceremonies of smoking and water blessing and message stick presentations. More than twelve bishops and many clergy and religious came to give support to the aboriginal people. I am sure our presence was also appreciated. Women were the biggest presence.

To me, the most memorable occasion was the Celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation presided over by Bishop Christopher Prowse. Everyone received general absolution and after a water blessing by the bishop, the elders from Balgo (all women) gave individually to all present, including all bishops and priests a hands on prayerful blessing of healing and forgiveness. For about half an hour, all lined up to receive this gift. Then all were given the opportunity to receive the Sacramental Rite of Reconcilia-

tion from the many bishops and priests scattered throughout the crowd in the Sport Stadium.

Let us pray that our contact with the people we met will bear much fruit in the furthering of Catholic Women's League Australia.

Dreaming from the Heart

On Sunday October 1, National Officers Mary Schultz, Pat Madigan and Helen Rodriquez joined me at Port Augusta SA for the journey by road to Alice Springs, to participate in the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Assembly.

This being a follow up to my visit with Bishop Collins in Darwin in

August, in CWLA's quest to regenerate interest in CWLA in Northern Territory and to invite the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women to be part on our organisation.

We were armed with many brochures, newsletters and even fridge magnets to give away to help spread the word at our booth at the Assembly market place between sessions.

We attended the traditional welcome to the country followed by Mass, presided by Bishop Collins from Darwin Diocese. The Bishop spoke of his memories of the visit of Pope John Paul II and of the Pope's wonderful address to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Alice Springs in 1986.

The Assembly began the next morning with a prayerful presentation given by people from NT and Tiwi Island. The NATSICC councillors were introduced and Mellisa Brickell of NT very ably chaired the Assembly. A video of the Pope's address given 20 years ago in Alice Springs was screened and for me this was a very high point in the whole week as every session of the Assembly revolved around that speech.

The presentation of the Message Sticks was again a very moving experience, as each State and Territory told of the Message Stick Journey throughout parishes in Australia.



From ancient times the Message Stick has been used to call people from different tribes together. The Sticks were similar in size with symbols of Christ and of the Pope's 1986 message in liturgy, song, dance, story activities and other ceremonies.

I attended a Message Sticks workshop, where participants discussed the Sticks journey. The schools throughout Australia really embraced the journey. One woman told of how peaceful the home was when the stick got there. Another told of her alcoholic husband completely getting over his addiction after the Stick's visit to their home. Others took them to cemeteries to be near their loved ones.

Celebrating Aboriginal Participation and Leadership was a panel discussion including Bishop Saunders from Broome. The discussion touched on many controversial issues especially the lack of Aboriginal Clergy. No Aboriginal man holds religious office higher than a deacon and the question remains: why?

That evening was the community celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation with Bishop Christopher Prowse, Archdiocese of Melbourne, presiding. 600 participants received the General rite of reconciliation and then were given the opportunity to receive the Sacrament rite of Reconciliation from the many Priests and Bishops scattered amongst the crowd in the huge sports stadium.

The Assembly began that day with a prayerful presentation from NSW and the ACT Spirit Dreaming. This was followed by an address by Mark Bin Bakar from Broome. His question was: What is the Heart of the Dream? Where there is no vision the people will perish. He believes that the plight of the Indigenous Australians is the most pressing problem in Australia.

Peter Smith from Mt Isa was the speaker at the next session—Reconciliation through Indigenous participation in the liturgy. His question—Is the European Way the only way to God? "This Assembly would not be happening if change were not happening. Spirit of belief—Jesus brings Peace. The most powerful thing the Missionaries did was to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ into our lives. The Catholic Church has opened its arms and welcomed us." Peter Smith, is an elder of Mt Isa, Catholic Community and World Council of Churches Australian representative at United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues.

Thelma Giros—spoke of shared solutions for all people and the importance of keeping young people connected to the Church. She quoted the Bishop who said: "We don't have all the power; the power is with you too. We all have different skin colour, but the blood is the same colour." Thelma maintains, "That like the Latin rite etc. there should be an indigenous rite with our own Bishop."



The Liturgy by the New Zealand Maoris, was enjoyed by all as they expressed their solidarity with Indigenous Australians.

Our National President Mary Schultz was then given an opportunity to express the thanks of our group for the welcome we all received at the Assembly and to tell of CWLA and our mission of inclusion for all women.

This was followed by a faith presentation by a very inspirational young man named Daniel Garlett of WA. He told the Assembly that he had been an activist since year 6 when he walked out of the history lesson because it wasn't being told the truth. He now works for the Aboriginal Catholic Ministry. "We must listen to help healing, also things are better said than unsaid."

We met with Mother Theresa's Sisters at Ngkerte Mikwekenhe—a centre for Aborigines. We participated in Holy hour and were able to meet with the Sisters and local women and discuss the possibility of them becoming part of CWLA. We were very lucky to also meet with Sister Helen Parer IBVM, a social worker in Alice Springs. I'm sure she will be a great influence on the women as well. We visited Sr Helen's home where she carries out much rehabilitation work with people.

That night was the youth Mass and the Message Stick presentation with Bishop Saunders from Broome and clergy from all over Australia including Bishop Hurley from my Port Pirie Diocese. This was another very moving event.

The book: "Land, Culture and Faith-Listening, Respecting, Responding, Connecting" a special issue from the Pacifica Australasian Theological Studies commemorating the 20th Anniversary Pope John Paul's address was launched. As was another book—Australia! - The Great South Land of the Holy Spirit - dedicated the renewal of Australian hearts.

We all felt very positive with our *reaching out* and the outcomes of our participation in the Assembly and look forward to a response from a wide area of God's far flung parish in the north of this great land. And we thank him for our safe 5400 kilometre journey to spread the word of Catholic Women's League Australia.

Bioethics

As we enter the Advent season and prepare for Christmas, most of us turn our thoughts to family. Our own close families, our extended families, maybe families less fortunate than ours, and of course the birth of Jesus that actually created what we call the Holy Family, all occupy our minds. I find it interesting that the area of bioethics also concentrates on 'family' - from the creation of life that starts a new family, to decisions about conception, contraception, abortion, illness, health research and choices about treatment for illness that may either, shape and sustain our family, or in some cases, devastate or damage a family. There are decisions related to end of life care and organ donation that can profoundly effect our family, if even for a time.

Our care about our individual families is, of course, transferred to all of God's family and so we find ourselves becoming more aware of the bioethics issues in our community, country and world. More than aware – we become active!

The latest issue of concern is Private members Bill, Prohibition of Human Cloning for Reproduction and the Regulation of Human Embryo Research Amendment Bill 2006. Congratulations to all members who individually and collectively provided submissions to this enquiry. You can look at the submissions online at the Senate website. The submission I presented on your behalf is submission number 107.

No doubt you were disappointed with the voting in the Senate as I was. As you are aware the voting was very close - the Senate voted 34 to 32 to pass the Bill to allow the creation of cloned human embryos for destructive research. The voting was so close, wasn't it? As I write this, the 'Patterson Bill' is being debated by the House of Representatives; it started on Monday, November 27. We have written, we have lobbied and we must continue to pray that reason will prevail – and if it does not – well perhaps there is our first challenge for 2007. But not the only one, so rest and enjoy the Christmas season with family – however it is constructed!

It can be purchased from the National Treasurer, Helen Rodriguez.


