The Gravest Social Issue: Forgetfulness of God

"The great problem of the West is forgetfulness of God and this forgetfulness is spreading" Pope Benedict XV1 commented. He said, "The modern spirit has lost its bearings, leaving many people unsure of what norms to transmit to their children. In many cases we no longer know how to use our freedom correctly, or what is morally right and wrong".

A three-year study of youth spirituality in Australia entitled *The Spirit of Generation Y (2003-2006*) conducted jointly by Monash University, The Australian Catholic University and the Christian Research Association found that in Australia:

- fewer than half those born between 1976-1990 believe in God or identify with traditional religion
- Generation Y relies on family and friends as the sources of its beliefs, values and social support
- an individual's views and preferences should not be questioned or constrained provided they harm no-one else
- spiritual or religious beliefs and practices are purely personal lifestyle choices and in no way necessary

All of which sounds very open minded and reasonable but for the fact that it entirely overlooks the real, personal, conscious, dynamic, necessary and perfecting relationship between us and our creator who calls us "kin". Bishop John Crowley: in fearful world enhance, encourage as St John of the Cross: "If you see a situation in life where there is not love, pour love in and you will get love out".

Bishop John Arnold: What would Margaret Fletcher think if here today -- suggesting proud!

Maureen Anderson: The Mass a great Praise and Thanks to God in the most holy way.

Enthusiasm, keynote of Grand Finale, as CWL National President Sheila Jennings closed AGM: "Celebrate the past and look to the future with enthusiasm!"

If young people look to their "family and friends as a source of beliefs and values," they are likely to be disappointed, because people have become unsure of what norms to transmit to their children.

Monash University Professor Gary Bourma who chairs a UNESCO Committee on Inter-religious and Intercultural Relations - and is author of "Australian Soul: Religion and Spirituality in the Twenty-First Century" rejoices that "while its long been assumed that religion is giving way to more scientific beliefs, Australia's soul is in fact alive and kicking, with spiritual life becoming increasingly diverse and less tied to formal organizations". Professor Bourma says that amongst religions on the rise is Buddhism, (up 79% since 1996). Islam (up 40%), Hinduism (up 42%), Pentecostalism (up 11%), nature religions including Paganism and Wicca/witchcraft, (up 130%) and Scientology (up 37%). Bourma says the historic reasons for seeking spirituality are especially relevant post 9/11 and that this event prompted a search for the meaning of life, dissatisfaction with materialism and scientific rationality, and a surge of natural compassion. His inclusion of Paganism and Witchcraft among growth indicators in spirituality, is indicative of the abandonment of a Benign Creator in favour of superhuman malign powers.

Many social ills arise from a forgetfulness of the One True God.

We who take salvation and mission seriously, believing and trusting in God who founded the Church as something necessary to salvation, have been given the task of converting unbelievers.

Mothers and Daughters in Action 2007

MaterCare International – National Project April 2007

In April 2007, every CWL Branch in Australia will be focussing their attention on MaterCare International, a non-government organisation dedicated to promoting safe motherhood through new initiatives of service, research, advocacy and training in accordance with the contemporary teaching contained in the Encyclical 'Evangelium Vitae' (the Gospel of Life).

MaterCare aims to promote long-term assistance for women's and children's health. Maternal mortality in developing countries is more than 100 times that in industrialised countries. Obstetric fistula, the most serious complication of childbirth where the mother survives, virtually disappeared from the developed world early in the 20th Century. But it is still a major problem in the developing world.

Most CWL branches or Member Organisations are holding a Fundraiser of choice – small or large – to promote the work of MaterCare International. A donation to support this care of mothers and their unborn children in developing countries, in accordance with the Gospel of Life, will be presented to a representative of MaterCare International, at the Catholic Women's League Australia National Conference in Adelaide, 12 – 14 September 2007.

CWLA's project is true to our "Living the Faith of Our Mothers" generational theme and scriptural quotation: ' How often have I wanted to put my arms around all – as a hen gathers her brood under her wings' Matthew 23:27.

Email from MaterCare International

Dear Mary & Colleagues,

Thankyou for choosing to fundraise for Mater-International (MCI Care _ website www.matercare.org) in 2007. In so doing the Catholic Women's League of Australia is supporting an honourable and hardworking organisation of voluntary Catholic professionals, inspired by Pope John-Paul II and the Culture of Life. We are an organisation dedicated to the care of mothers and babies, both born and unborn, through new initiatives of service, training, research and advocacy, which are designed to reduce the tragically high of maternal rates mortality, morbidity (obstetric fistula) and abortion.

The work of MCI has been recognized by the United Nations and through peer-reviewed awards. Almost certainly it is the only Non-Government Organization working in the developing world with a commitment to reducing the tragically high rates of abortion, as well as maternal mortality and morbidity.

MCI is a division of the World Federation of Catholic Medical Associations, and it has branches in many countries including Australia. I am a Melbourne-based obstetrician/ gynaecologist and currently chair both MCI and MaterCare Australia. At a recent MCI meeting in Rome your generous offer of support was brought to the International Board's attention and gratefully acknowledged. What follows is an outline of our activities and where any funds raised may be spent.

MCI has just completed its first obstetric fistula hospital in West Africa (Ghana), and plans to replicate this elsewhere, beginning with Rwanda. We are currently also seeking funding for a maternity hospital and essential rural obstetrics project in Isiolo, Kenya. This project will be a tribute to Pope John-Paul II and the late Bishop of Isiolo Diocese, Luigi Locati, who was mediating between tribal groups in the area when he was murdered. It will serve as a stimulus for reconciliation for those involved.


In East Timor MaterCare Australia has arranged courses on safe motherhood for midwives, we continue to send medical supplies and are trying to provide obstetric staff for St Paul's Hospital in Suai. MaterCare Singapore is rebuilding a maternity hospital destroyed by the 2004 Tsunami in Nias, Indonesia.

As well as promoting safe motherhood, we promote respect for all human life from conception to natural death, especially within the medical community. For example, MaterCare Australia members recently made submissions to the Australian Senate, opposing legislative changes that would facilitate the use of RU 486 as an abortion drug. Worldwide, MCI provides much-needed fellowship and support to all our colleagues who hold similar views and who are experiencing difficulty practising according to those beliefs. Every two years we hold a workshop in Rome to consider these issues and at our inaugural workshop in 2001, we were honoured to be received in private audience with Pope John-Paul II who unequivocally endorsed our work.

On behalf of the mothers and babies we serve I thank you wholeheartedly for your generosity. We look forward to meeting with your members in the New Year and welcome any opportunity to speak about our work.

Archbishop Denis Hart Recognises 90 Years of Service given by The Catholic Women's League Victoria and Wagga Wagga

In 1916, 90 years ago, the 2nd Archbishop of Melbourne Archbishop Thomas Carr celebrated the inaugural Mass of the "Catholic Women's Social Guild", later to be known as Catholic Women's League. Few people attending that Mass would have imagined in 2006, the 8th Archbishop of Melbourne Archbishop Denis Hart would celebrate the Eucharist on October 15th 2006 thank God for the same continuing apostolate.

Thanks to the foresight of Dr Mary Glowrey, the first President, who was one of a group of ladies inspired by a talk given by Fr Lockington SJ the "Guild" was formed.

Members of Catholic Women's League (CWL), their families and friends, numbers approximately 400 were part of the huge congregation in St Patrick's Cathedral Melbourne to celebrate and recognise 90 years of dedicated service given by CWL.

The opening lines of the entrance hymn, "O God our Help in Ages Past", our hope for years to come: seemed to suitably express the wish of every one of the CWL members present, and those unable to attend.

Many ladies had travelled a great distance to thank God, catch up with friends and share a meal together. A tribute to the importance they place on the work of CWL and the friendships they have formed.

At the same Celebration of the Eucharist two young men, Binh Le and Thinh Vu were being presented to the Archbishop as worthy candidates to continue their studies for Ordination to the Diaconate of the Priesthood, described by the Archbishop as 'Called to Prayer and Study, to serve God's People.' Many Seminarians were there to support, relate to and witness the unselfishness of these two young men.

Also present were a husband and wife, celebrating 50 years of married life shared together, along with their family and friends.

Welcoming all present Archbishop Hart said it

was a celebration of Priesthood, Marriage and Community.

The Scripture Readings spoke of the eternal reward we can expect for the service we give. The readings were reverently proclaimed by Therese Tyndall, Shepparton, and Brenda Finlayson, Ballarat.

During the homily the Archbishop reminded all present everything we have is a gift from God, by reaching out into society in so many ways, we are recognising and expressing gratitude to God for those gifts. In following Christ it is all or nothing. Are we vibrant parts of God's plan? Referring to CWL the Archbishop was generous in his praise, thanking God for women who see faith to be 'lived' and added, "No group does it better than the Catholic Women's League."

The reverence and dignity of the Archbishop and the concelebrants Frs Harvey, Plunkett, Larcen and Teal all dedicated and greatly appreciated Chaplains (past or present) to Catholic Women's League and Very Rev Dean Baron the present Chaplain to Victoria Wagga Wagga was awe inspiring; this spiritual guidance has been invaluable. Fr Paddy Bohan who preceded Fr Geoff was unable to attend due to Parish commitments.

The 'Heavenly' Choir singing magnificently in Gregorian Chant, the parts of the Mass and the responses, together with the splendour and décor of the Cathedral, all enhanced a day long to be remembered.

The Communion Hymn "Where there is Charity and Love", and recessional hymn "Be Thou My Vision" related so well to Catholic Women's League in the past, as well as encouraging and challenging the present members as we go forth into the future.

Following the Eucharist Celebration it was time for refreshments with a welcome from Madge Fahy—Victoria Wagga Wagga President. Next stop Mary Glowrey House for the cutting of the cake which was made and beautifully decorated by Betty Christie, Shepparton and thank you to the ever helpful care takers: Leon and Helen Farrell.

Let us offer a prayer of thanksgiving and gratitude for the vision of Dr Mary Glowery, and the women of 1916 who inspired by the words of Fr Lockington, set out to further develop authentic Catholic views and opinions, to uphold Catholic values and ethics and to work to improve the conditions of women and children. Doing so by animating from within, not ordering from above. It is now our task, the present members to emulate, let us do so with open hearts and minds, not discriminating against race, colour and creed.

Let us all acknowledge with gratitude the organising committee. Many thanks to each one of you for a most enjoyable and memorable day.

Australia Day Mass

A well attended Australia Day Mass, January 26, 2007 was celebrated in St Francis Xavier's Cathedral with Archbishop Philip Wilson the main celebrant, Bishop Greg O'Kelly, Emeritus Archbishop Leonard Faulkner, Monsignor David Cappo, and 4 priests concelebrating, while Fr. Joe Grealy, Archdiocesan CWL Chaplain attended.

The Australia Day Mass has been organized by the Knights of the Southern Cross, Therry Dramatic Society and the Catholic Women's League for many years. This year we were supported by John Luttrill, Coordinator of Archdiocesan Events.

We gave thanks for our Nation and our people and as part of this celebration we congratulated and honoured the Catholic faithful of our Archdiocese who had been recipients of an Order of Australia.

Presentation of National Symbols

Australia is a land of light, colour and rich in symbolism. It is a land of contrasts ad vast distances, of deserts and bush growth, mountain ranges and golden beaches. We see the death of Christ in the bushfire and celebrate the resurrection in the growth of life and the hope that follows. Representatives from Therry Society, CWL and Knights of the Southern Cross placed symbols that represented our wonderful country on the sanctuary.

Our National Flag with its Federation Star, reminds us that we are one people.

Our State Flag, with the Piping Shrike speaks

of our pride in our own State of South Australia.

The Aboriginal Flag represents the original owners of this land, their sufferings, and their reverence and care for this land.

Green and Gold are our national colours – the colour of the wattle. We place these coloured cloths on the altar in gratitude for the incredible beauty of our country.

The Opal – a symbol of the many colours of our land, of the creator Rainbow Serpent of the Dreaming and the promise God made through the rainbow to all creation.

The Sturt Desert Pea – our State floral emblem, with its vivid red colouring, growing so close to the soil. It is a symbol of all the flora and fauna that is so unique to our country.

A Painting by Sir Hans Heysen and a book by Colin Thiele: South Australia has always been blessed with creative people – artists, sculptors, writers, musicians and composers. The biennial Festival of Arts epitomized by these two great South Australians, is a celebration of this.

Two Books – one telling the history of South Australia. We pride ourselves in being the only State not founded on the sufferings of the convicts, but out first settlers also suffered and experienced drought, famine, recession and many hardships to make our State what it is today.

Our second book tells the history of our Church in this State, one that has been very dependent on the lay people for its survival, particularly in the years before a priest came to the Colony. The love for God and the faithfulness shown by these early settlers has given us a rich inheritance to treasure and nourish.
