Let us remember in prayer 'our' MaterCare mothers and those not in reach of care.

CWLA Harmony Day celebrations, involving Sudanese women, from which evolved: a Women's Leadership Course for women of diverse cultural and language (CALD) backgrounds, provided by TAFE SA Adelaide, funded by the Govt Secretariat, Australian Women's Coalition, managed by NCWA. Reflections—National Chaplain



As I come to the end of my term as National Chaplain, I have a confession to make. There is no branch of the Catholic Women's League in my parish! (although one parishioner did attend the National Conference). In one of my previous appointments – at St Luke's, Noarlunga Downs – there was a very active branch.

Being national chaplain was a most enjoyable experience. It was great to work with such a dedicated team as the National Executive here in Adelaide. I was constantly amazed at their capacity, as a group of volunteers, to draw the threads together for such a large and successful National Conference, and to do so with a wonderful harmonious spirit. Congratulations to them all. For me it was also a joy to bring to the Conference my love for, and experience of the Church's liturgy.

There are two things I would like to offer reflections on, one relating to the conference itself, and the other to the future of the League.

Conference Resolutions

It was interesting to read the resolutions which came from the various member organisations to the

National Conference. They reflected the concerns of Catholic women across the nation, especially in relation to family and life issues. And one could legitimately expect that. But I wondered about those other issues which also impact upon the lives of people, especially women – poverty, in Australia and beyond; refugees and their welcome to Australia; Indigenous Australians and national reconciliation; Church leadership and the role of women; language in the Church as it impacts upon women; dialogue with, and understanding of women of other faiths. I felt that the focus of concern was far too narrow for a national organisation in modern Australia

The other thing that struck me was that almost all of the resolutions were about directing member organisations to write to politicians about the issues raised. This, I thought, made them pretty useless resolutions. It was all out there, seeing our society in a negative way, directing others to do something about it. The resolutions did not call for any personal reflection, examination of heart, corporate or individual action through which members would continue to move ahead creating change for the common good.

I was left wondering about the value of so much time being spent on the resolutions. Generally resolutions are not the agents for change and development. I suspect that many of the speakers were more powerful in helping enrich the faith of participants, strengthening their resolve to be agents for a better society, increasing their understanding of the issues at hand, shaping a spirit open to other possibilities and hopes, affirming appreciation of the goodwill found in others. In other words, fostering a more positive appreciation of God, Church and society. Perhaps having resolutions and dedicating so much time to them is now an outdated way of spending time together.

Future of the League

One of the really good things was to hear of the growth of the Catholic Women's League within the Catholic Ukrainian Eparchy (Diocese), and to welcome such a large group from Papua New Guinea. My parish, in the western suburbs of Adelaide, is a very working class area. After World War II, it grew rapidly and became the home for many European refugees and migrants. Later it saw a large influx of Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees, and more recently refugees from various African nations. In addition, migrants from the Philippines and India are settling in the area. I would say that, looking at my Sunday congregations, for eighty percent, English is their second language.

The Catholic Church in Australia, now and into the future, is very multicultural. If the Catholic Women's League is going to continue to be relevant and to grow, then it needs to explore how to embrace the diversity of women in our pews, whose experiences of life, insights and priorities may be very different from the founding and present membership.

To engage the CWL with our multicultural Church in any significant way, is to take a step into the unknown. It means moving out of comfort zones in order to offer the hand of friendship, to stop and talk with parishioners from other lands, listening patiently to their different accents. It will mean reshaping the way meetings are conducted in order to show value for different ways of doing things. But it will be worth while. There is enormous energy in refugee and migrant people. They are here to make a new beginning. They are full of hope. They show us courage and perseverance.

In one of my Churches, where the congregation is predominantly Vietnamese families, with older Italian, Polish and Maltese parishioners, some families from Burundi have arrived. Now the Vietnamese guitars rock to African drums, the singing is in English, Vietnamese and Swahili, and all the children head for the school playground together after Mass.

I would love to see the Catholic Women's League take on that kind of vibrancy, friendship and hope. It has started, let the good times keep rolling.

Thank you for allowing me to be your National Chaplain for the past two years. It was a privilege and a joy.

Margo Nancarrow reflects...



Advent is a season of waiting! It is a season when we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus. I guess Mary was like any other pregnant woman waiting, anticipating being a mother and perhaps just a little apprehensive about the birth of her child and probably wishing the birth could be sooner

We need to remember that with bioethical issues affecting the dignity and sacredness of life - the safety, wellbeing and sanctity of the unborn child holds a special significance at this time of the Church's year.

Portfolio Reports

In late October this year the presidents of the Bishops' Conferences of England and Wales and Scotland said that the scale of abortion in their countries is a source of anguish for everyone, regardless of creed or political convictions. "Developmental biology makes increasingly clear the beautiful and intricate processes of continuous development and growth of the single unique organism that is formed at conception."

"The Catholic Church has taught from its earliest days, and continues to teach that the direct and voluntary killing of the unborn, at any stage and by what ever means, is gravely wrong. Science has now put beyond doubt that life begins at fertilization, thus reinforcing our duty to protect and respect human life from the moment of conception". (Brigid McKenna, 2007)

Issues that have attracted our attention and concern during this year are the production of embryos for destruction so that their stem cells can be used for research; the increased access to the abortion drug, RU486; the chorus of disapproval against the Catholic Church supported pregnancy support and counselling services; the mooted changes to the law regarding abortions (as in Victoria); the suggestion of the abortion of babies with proven or even suspected disabilities or disorders; the increasing use of prenatal diagnosis for sex selection and abortions; the abortion of babies called 'mid trimester' or 'late term'. Quote is from a doctor in The Age newspaper, 25 April 1998, -"I'm personally happy to do terminations at 26, 28 and 30 weeks but I know that the public and the politicians won't accept that." Dr David Grundmann".

The research by Fleming and Ewing in 2005 showed that 64% to 73% of Australians think the abortion rate is too high, and 87% believe it would be a good thing if the number were reduced while at the same time protecting existing legal rights to freely choose abortion. They also found that there was "*Near unanimous support for serious consideration of all the alternatives before choosing abortion".* In other words, they believe abortion should be a last resort.

It is because we recognise of the value of life from its very beginning that these issues cause us sorrow. CWLA members can support the organisations in our areas that work with women facing an 'unwanted' or difficult pregnancies, e.g. Centacare, Real Choices Australia, Pregnancy Support Australia, Stand up Girl, Karinya House.

We can welcome women who have been through an abortion experience in our own communities.

We can support post abortion organisations such as Project Rachel and Open Doors.

We can remain up to date with the Bills etc that unholy politicians are planning to present to Parliament that relate to EST research or cloning; abortion and abortion legislation.

We can make our objections about immoral bioethical issues known to our elected MPs and Senators at both Federal and State levels and make submissions as necessary and...

We can pray! We can pray that our babies are safe in the womb and make it to the cradle and we can offer practical and spiritual support where possible.

Thank you to all for the help and support that you have given me throughout the year and may God's blessings be heaped upon you this Christmas season and into the New Year.

The Prophetic Role of Women Religious in the fight against Trafficking in Persons Congress was held in Rome from Oct 15-20 2007.

Catholic sisters from 26 countries launched The International Network of Religious Against Trafficking in Persons (INRATIP) dedicated to strengthening the global fight against sexual labour and organ trafficking,

'Trafficking in human beings means the recruitment , transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons using threat, force, coercion, fraud, deception or abuse of power by payments to achieve consent or control over a person for the purpose of exploitation. Trafficking in children requires only the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of a child for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall mean, among other things, sexual exploitation, domestic service, forced labour or removal of organs.'

'Trafficking in human beings is now one of the most lucrative and fastest growing transnational crimes generating approximately up to \$10 billion per year: readers are reminded that 50% of trafficking victims worldwide are children.' This statement comes from COMBAT CHILD TRAFFICKING Handbook for parliamentarians No.9 2005 – an 84 page document which was a collaborative effort between UNICEF and the Inter-Parliamentary Union.

In Australia, quietly and largely unnoticed, the incidence of sex slave trafficking is increasing.

The recently released and highly acclaimed Australian film 'The Jammed', a triumph for a film maker Dee McLachlan, depicts Ashley, a young Melbourne woman unexpectedly drawn from her mundane insurance job into the underworld as she reluctantly agrees to help a Chinese mother search for her missing daughter in Melbourne. As the story unfolds, the sinister workings of human trafficking, forced prostitution and government deportation are exposed.

Actual events and Australian court transcripts inspire the film that informs us of the plight of trafficked women in the hope that Australians will find ways to rescue and rehabilitate them. Talented actors dedicated to telling the story display very real emotion. This 'must see' film was made in just 19 days on an extremely tight budget. The story is very moving and the more people who see it the greater possibility there is of stemming this sexual abuse, prosecuting traffickers and eradicating this dreadful trade. Please make every effort to promote and see this film.

It has been a privilege and honour for me to serve at the national level over the past 8 years—two (2) as the inaugural Social Issues Convenor and then six (6) as the National International Secretary (NIS).

Recognising a dire need for the Social Issues portfolio to grow if it was to become more effective on a national basis, I encouraged

Maree Triffett, a lovely and talented young woman, to nominate for the position. Maree was subsequently elected and has succeeded in expanding the scope of our social justice work. The current Social Issues Convenor, Betty Roberts, continues in this vein and Social Issues has become another vital part of the work of CWLA Inc.

The late Olive Reichman nominated me for the position of NIS. I agreed simply because I thought that it was a fairly safe bet that I would not be elected. I was wrong!

Taking on the NIS role forced me to step out of my 'comfortable Catholic zone' and face the reality that I could no longer pick and choose the issues that suited me, but rather, I had to look at the 'whole picture'. It has been a steep learning curve, often frustrating and at other times very rewarding. This process has also served to deepen my faith and, understanding and love for the Church.

While there have been many highlights over the past six years, the ones that stand out for me are:

- WUCWO being granted the status of a Public Association under the Code of Canon Law;
- the Maria Goretti Resolution to the WUCWO General Assembly; and
- the Doha trip during the International Year of the Family+10.

My experiences as NIS have re-affirmed my belief in the substance and works of the CWL. Issues that our members have been dealing with for decades such as poverty, violence against women and children, human rights and the many dangers threatening the family are increasingly being tackled by other groups, who may benefit from our experience. CWL has both an amazing history and presence. Our members have significant expertise. We need to spread the word!

While I won't miss the UN or New York in the winter months with its freezing cold and bleak weather, I will miss those pro-family and pro-life people whom I have come into contact with over these past six years. Most especially, I will miss Arlene Champoux who has been a source of great inspiration for me. We shared many frustrating hours listening to people who think that the only way to solve the world's many problems is to make abortion a woman's human right.

My thanks also to the CWLA Inc National Council members for giving me the opportunity to represent the League at an international level. Sincere thanks also to the National Executive members and the Member Organisations International Secretaries for their support. Many a time, the International Secretaries were called upon to reply to WUCWO Questionnaires that arrived late in December and required a response by the end of January. Never once did they let me down. Well done ladies!

I have been most fortunate and blessed in being able to share a great working relationship with Brenda Finlayson, WUCWO Vice President General and WUCWO Board Member Australia, and Gillian Badcock, WUCWO Secretary General.

Thora Regan AM, the incoming NIS, will bring her own fresh perspective to this position and I have no doubt that she will represent the League at the international level with grace and witness. I ask for your continued prayers on behalf of those who fight for life and justice.

The CWLD Project launched this year is well under way. The project, aimed at linking women with the resources they need to develop their leadership skills is available through workshops, scholarships and mentoring. Two successful workshops have been held this year.

Two further workshops will be held in 2008. The first entitled "Leading Your Family to Health and Wellbeing" in the Parramatta Diocese on Saturday 8th March, 9.30am-12.30pm at The Sisters of Mercy Centre, 6 Victoria Road, Parramatta. With two presenters for this workshop – Gabrielle Donlevy and Sally Harrison.

The second workshop of 2008 "Women Leading International Development" will be in the Maitland-Newcastle Diocese on Saturday 31st May, 9.30am – 12.30pm in The Toohey Room at the Maitland-Newcastle Diocesan Offices, Newcastle. The presenter will be Liz Stone from Caritas, Australia.

A maximum of four scholarships, each to the value of \$1,500, is being made available by CWLA-NSW open to women up to the age of 55 years. Applicants can apply for a course or program they believe will assist their leadership development. The criteria for course selection is available with the Application Form with the one necessity that they attend a Workshop.

Each successful scholarship applicant will be offered the services of a leadership mentor who will be available to support and encourage them through their course or program.

Chief celebrant was Bishop Peter Connors, with concelebrants, Bishop Ronald Mulkearns, (Former Bishop of Ballarat Diocese), Fr Adrian McInerney PP of St Alipius, Fr P Bohan Diocesan Chaplin, Fr D Arundell, and Fr M Colansante.

During the homily Bishop Connors spoke of the invitation issued in 1917, by the late Bishop Foley to Fr Lockington to attend a meeting in Ballarat, with the possibility of introducing the Catholic Women's Social Guild (now known as the Catholic Women's League) into the Diocese. Four hundred enthusiastic ladies attended that meeting, the atmosphere was positive, resulting in the start of many Branches throughout the Diocese.

During the following years 89 Branches were formed, 24 Branches remain today.

Bishop Connors referred to the prayer and spirituality of the League and likened the support Mary and Elizabeth had offered each other, to that of the Catholic Women's League, and the work they do. He also mentioned the Priests in the Diocese being grateful for the support the CWL Branches offer in their parishes.

Nieces of Dr Mary Glowrey (accompanied by their husbands), and a grand niece, were present. Sr Mary Glowrey, Society of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, (niece of Dr Mary Glowrey) spoke briefly, offered congratulations saying, Women have always taken an active role down through the ages, promoting and doing the work of the Church.

The Conference Dinner was **almost** the 'icing on the cake' of the Conference. Not a quiet affair with 360 Dinner guests enjoying great food, congenial company, and South Australian talent and internationally-acclaimed comedienne Fiona O'Loughlin. All in all a superb night.
